Music Unit Plans

What is a unit?

- A series of related lessons
- ...organized around a central topic
- ...that together comprise a portion of the curriculum
- ...and end with a culminating activity,
 - e.g., performance, presentation, product (composition, paper, test, recording, etc.)

How to choose a unit topic?

- interesting to both teacher and students
 - E.g., Canadian Folk Music
- 'generative' able to stimulate learning, thinking, discussion, activity, curiosity, creativity
- connect students to a 'big idea' within the domain
 - significance of folk music as a means of self and cultural expression
- inspires 'essential questions' more about inquiry than answers
 - How and why do Canadians, past and present, express themselves through folk music?

What can be a unit topic?

- a musical concept: music in video games, advertising
- a musical skill: preparing a concert, producing a recording
- a piece: Folksong Medley
- a musical genre: blues, bossa nova, plainchant, gamelan
- performers: Yo Yo Ma, Drake, Canadian Brass, Rheostatics
- a composer/ songwriter
- etc.

How to design a unit?

- Identify topic
 - interesting, generative, connect to 'big ideas'?
- Identify appropriate learning outcomes
 - mandated curricula, and learning that YOU care about
- Determine ways students can demonstrate the learning
 - various products and performances
- Plan learning experiences
 - ...that will enable them to CREATE those products and performances, i.e.,
 - music to perform and listen to
 - *diverse* class and homework activities
- Gather/create the necessary resources you will need
 - scores/parts, ppts, recordings, handouts, etc.
